




World Language	4 years	any one language		
Electives	1 – 3 years	Fine/performing arts, computer science/technology, CTE (business, family/consumer science, industrial tech, ag)

# Why Optimum Preparation

- Recommended as courses that best prepare for collegelevel academics
- College-bound students, or students with career goals heavily focused in math or science should take the fourth year of math and science
- Studies show taking a year off can lead to remedial courses at the college-level and make the transition to college much more difficult
- Remedial courses often DO NOT count as college credit but cost the same and regular college courses

## **Entrance Exams**

- Take standardized tests junior year
  - ACT® or SAT® Exams
  - Prepare
  - Score well
  - Retake (if allowed)
  - ACCU-Placer or ASSET®
- Work closely with admission offices to learn about each college's requirements

# Tips for College Fairs

- Visit at least five college booths
  - Compare schools
  - Separate from your friends
  - Look on your own
- Look over exhibitor list
  - Have they sent you information?
- Collect brochures & business cards
  - Get a contact name
- Make a good impression
  - Representative you meet may be involved in admission decisions

# Make Campus Visits

Start visits sophomore and junior year and while college is in session.

- Make appointments
  - Campus tour
  - Overnight stay if allowed
  - Sit in on a class
  - Meet with faculty and/or current students
  - Visit the Financial Aid Office

- Is there a career center on campus?
- Ask questions and revisit if needed
- Write down your impressions. Take pictures
- How does it feel?


- Focus on grades and involvement in high school

- Start application process during the summer


# How Can Parents Help?





# SP<sup>3</sup> – Student Planning Pointers for Parents

- Email service for parents of students in 8<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade
- The email service is designed to help parents and their students plan for education and training after high school by:
  - Giving timely information based on the grade of the student and time of the year
  - Helping prompt conversations between parents and students about preparing for life after high school
- How It Works
  - Register at <u>www.SP3.org</u>
  - Receive two emails per month on relevant topics
  - Use the tools and tips with your student
  - Be entered into quarterly drawings for 529 colleges savings plan deposits (40 winners of \$250 deposits each quarter)




